Condorito the Condor

The Main Stamp

In March 2000, the Chilean postal authority issued a set of four stamps and a sheetlet with one stamp dedicated to the Latin American hero, Condorito, the Condor.

Condorito is a comic-book and comic-strip character based on the Condor, a bird which is an important symbol for many of the countries in South America. For example, the Andean Condor is the national bird of Bolivia, Chile, Colombia and Ecuador.



René Rios Boettiger was responsible for the design of the cartoons that are the basis of the stamps in this set (see below). The Chilean postal authority issued: 3 million of the \$150 stamp (Condorito celebrating the Millennium); 300,000 of the \$260 value

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(Condorito as a football player); 300,000 of the \$480 stamp (Condorito as a Firefighter); and 100,000 of the \$980 value (Condorito on horseback).¹

The Characters

<u>Key Facts²</u>

- Condorito came to life on 6 August 1949, in the first issue of Okey magazine in Chile.
- Cartoonist René Rios, better known as Pepo, created the character of Condorito.
- Condorito lives in the fictional town of Pelotillehue.
- Condorito's nephew is called Coné, with whom he shares a number of adventures. Condorito also has a very clever (human) niece, Yuyito.

- Other characters in the comic strip include human friends Don Chuma, the none too bright Ungenio, the hard-boiled Huevoduro, and Garganta de Lata, who likes a drink or two.
- Condorito has two pets: the dog Washington; and the rather vocal parrot Matias.
- Condorito's eternal girlfriend and life-partner is Yayita.
- Condorito's main rival is Pepe Cortisona.
- Condorito's father-in-law is Don Cuasimodo, who loves to spend money and doesn't like Condorito. Condorito's mother-in-law is Doña Tremebunda Vinagre and like her husband, she does not think that Condorito is a worthy suitor for her daughter.
- In 2018, Condorito appeared in an animated film, "Condorito- la película" in which Condorito seeks to win the love of Yayita by saving his mother-in-law from invading evil aliens.

In this Spanish stamp, the Andean Condor is used as a symbol which unites the countries of Peru, Venezuela, Ecuador, Colombia and Bolivia all of which were signatories to the Andean Pact: the stamp celebrates the 15th anniversary of this economic agreement.
